## Food And Hope For The Future

David Phipps has dreams of being a successful gardener, and dreams of helping individuals and families to become well fed and independent. An avid reader, David has researched several books on agriculture, consulted with teachers of agriculture, and has detailed a plan for an income producing farm. Until recently, however, David Phipps had not turned a shovel for twenty years. He is an inmate at Riverbend Maximum Security Institution in Nashville, Tennessee Through a program initiated by the warden and chaplain of Riverbend, Healing Hands International was invited to work with a pilot group of ten inmates to break ground on a garden "within the walls" of the prison. Randy McCadams, a west Tennessee farmer and Healing Hands volunteer, and Jim Pounders, HHI staff member, spent two evenings with the inmates, preparing them to "start small" and bring physical growth and spiritual pride to fellow inmates. Inmates learned that Jesus often illustrated his teaching with stories of agriculture, as in the parable of the sower (Matthew 13).

On October 6, 2012, McCadams, Pounders, and the selected inmates tilled and planted a 30 feet by 50 feet garden on the Riverbend compound. A winter crop of mustard and turnip greens were sewn. Following the winter, as the soil becomes more receptive through sun, rain, fertilizing

and growth, a broader effort is planned in the spring of 2013. With the help of 20 inmates, raised beds and drip irrigation will enable inmates to enlarge the garden, planting and harvesting vegetables which can be consumed by their fellow inmates.

David Phipps and his fellow inmates are learning about God's plan to provide physical and spiritual food for his people, and in the process, they may learn how to
provide for their families and perhaps even provide a livelihood when they are released.

## "Aggie Agnes" Has Hope

In June, Agnes was one of 75 farmers who participated in the 3 day village food security workshop at Tula, Kenya. In the workshop co-sponsored by Healing Hands International and Caring for Kenya, Ebenezer Udofia and Carl Burkybile taught composting, construction of raised planting beds, drip irrigation, and mulching.

The ten workshop beds plus previously constructed planting beds along with rabbit production, laying hens, milk goats, and rainwater harvesting are serving as a demonstration farm where people are coming to see and learn. Seeing what can be done gives them hope for the future and results in additional workshop request for other communities.

Most of the Tula workshop graduates have made compost piles and many have constructed raised planting beds. Once graduates have a compost pile and a raised planting bed, HHI is committed to providing drip irrigation kits. A farmer's first drip irrigated planting bed will provide the vegetables to feed the family and the additional beds will provide income for school fees and other family needs.

Justus Mutua, workshop host, says he is especially proud of Agnes. She, with the help of her children, constructed and planted 17 raised beds. When Justus saw even the small children in the family carrying water from the river for the planting

## Giving Kids A Voice In Haiti

"It is through education that children are empowered to think for themselves and learn that their voice has power to make changes for the betterment of their lives." This is the philosophy that Dr. Bobbie Solley has brought to the education program at Healing Hands International.

As Bobbie began to make preparations for her trip to Haiti for the beginning of their school year, she collected school supplies from supporters of HHI and put together 150 learning packs for each of the students in the school. A few days before she left the U.S. she got an email from the principal telling her that there would now be 300 students!

Rather than panicking, we simply turned to our faithful supporters and got the word out that we had an urgent need. Over the weekend, sewing groups across the country spent hours sewing drawstring backpacks. Individuals collected school supplies to send in and before Bobbie left we had 300 packs ready to go with her. We were again amazed and overwhelmed by the generous response of God's people.

Bobbie had a wonderful week teaching the teachers at the Gantier school how to interact with their students. She said that it was amazing to see the wide eyes on the students as their teachers read to them for the first time.

There are several ways that you can be involved in giving a voice to children around the world:
I. Give a Learning Pack: For a one-time donation of $\$ 25$ you can ensure that a child has a backpack filled with all of the supplies she will need for a successful school year.
II. Adopt a Teacher: For \$15 a month you can ensure that a teacher has all of the

III. Train a Teacher: For $\$ 30$ a month you can provide a teacher with the training she needs to change a culture one child at a time. This includes an intensive week long workshop in the summer, as well as several 2-3 sessions throughout the year with children in the classroom.
