## “This is the best thing I’ve done in my lifetime.”

**A** year ago, we were introduced to K.J. Wright, linebacker for the Seattle Seahawks. The relationship developed when Wright was deeply moved by what he saw in the Masai Mara region of Kenya – a dire need for clean water. It was then that a dream began to take shape to bring clean water to this area.

After an introduction to Healing Hands International, plans developed for Wright to lead the fundraising efforts for drilling two water wells through HHI. Supporters stepped up to bring this dream to reality. Fast-forward to June of 2019 and one well has already been drilled and is functional in the village of Keringani. Wright recently returned to Kenya along with family, friends and Healing Hands representatives to celebrate this first victory. For Wright, it was a victory very different than those he experiences on the gridiron, but even more fulfilling.

“Ever since I was younger, my mom told me that ‘Son, you are blessed and highly favored, so whenever you are blessed, it’s very important that you bless others,’” Wright shared. “This is the best thing I’ve done in my lifetime.”

Village elders from Keringani expressed their own joy after this transformational gift for their community. Every day, villagers from this region travel miles to find any water,

much less a source of clean water. The well now represents a better and healthier way of life, which gives them freedom to pursue new sources of income and education. It also provides them more time to invest in their community and their families. Hearts respond to Jesus Christ when hearts are opened with a new lease on life!

The more than \$76,000 raised for K.J. Wright’s project will continue to bring clean water to this region after another well will be drilled soon in another village. We are thankful to everyone who has been a part of this project, and we know that doors have been opened for future projects in Kenya and beyond.

“Thanks to Healing Hands International,” said Wright. “Clearly you have good energy and good blessings to make this happen.” Thank you K.J.!

Grandparents foster legacy of service




#### LOST COINS

In 2017, Elaine Estep shared a story with her then 7-year old granddaughter, Carter, about a young man who grew up with very little money. When the young man's mother would find coins on the street, she would share them with him so that he could buy a small treat like candy. Together, Carter and her "Nana" decided that they could also collect "lost coins" to bless other children.

Their idea started small with Carter using a handful of found change to purchase small treats for children at the dollar store. From there, she started finding enough coins to create small gift bags for special needs children at her school. But Carter wasn't satisfied and wanted to do more, Elaine said. After rallying the support of their church's ladies class and other members at College Hills Church of Christ in Lebanon, Tenn., Carter was eventually able to raise more than \$2,000.

Carter knew that her church was very active in the MAGI Project, so she knew that the money she raised could be a tremendous blessing to even more children. She also has other plans including purchasing school supplies and Bibles for children closer to home and abroad.

"She gets very excited to know that children are going to be happy and blessed," Elaine said. "So far, Carter has purchased over \$700 in items to include in some of the MAGI boxes this year. Carter hopes to encourage other children in other churches to make their own 'Lost Coins' jars and bless other children too."

Vicki Williams of Ashland City, Tenn. has been volunteering with Healing Hands for more than ten years. She regularly sews for the Dorcas ministry and does craft projects to include in MAGI boxes. This year, she included her grandchildren Rilee Kate (7) and Weston (4) in her MAGI box projects.

One MAGI box project involves decorating and filling tin mint boxes with small items for children. Together, “Nana” and her grandkids shop at the dollar store for small items for each box such as marbles, beads and string, colored rocks, and tiny animals, just to name a few. Rilee Kate and Weston began with filling the boxes, but they soon started using the hot glue gun and their creativity to personalize each box. Now they are excited about their next project to convert crew neck T-shirt material into headbands, Vicki added.

“I want them to be mission minded,” Vicki said. “I teach them through play. They love creating things for children that they don’t know. I don’t think you need to wait until kids are grown to teach them how to be servants.”

## The gift that keeps giving

**D**uring the last week of June, two members of our Walk4Water team (Sean Judge and Caleb McCurry) traveled to Haiti with members from the Singing Oaks Church of Christ in Denton, Texas. The group spent time in Kay Michou and Coup Mardi Gras –communities that have received water wells through Walk4Water sponsorships. Wells occasionally break and are difficult to maintain, said Sean Judge, Walk4Water Director. While drilling is the critical first step to clean water, maintenance becomes just as important. New Water Project Coordinator, James Rucker, will lead these efforts in the region to continue giving people hope for a better future.

“One of the things I enjoy about these trips is watching how over the time we are there, the experiences at the well bring a whole new appreciation for this mission,” Judge said. “Whether we are installing a new pump or repairing a pump that is not working, once completed, the flow of water is something that never gets old to watch.”

While there, the Singing Oaks team asked to assist with the repair of two wells while also distributing Creole New Testaments. These wells bring numerous opportunities to share the gospel message. A local minister named Bichotte is also bringing God’s word to those coming to these local wells. We praise God for this opportunity!

She has since been baptized into Christ and recently completed her final exams!

## The journey to restoration

The Nashville Healing Hands staff recently discovered a surprise waiting in their parking lot - a donated pump truck that had traveled around 2,500 miles from Idaho to Tennessee. Longtime volunteer driller, Arron Swenson, offered to drive the truck on this journey before it reaches its final destination in Haiti.

“Arron [Swenson] is the kind of guy you want on your team no matter what you are doing,” said HHI Vice President, Joseph Smith. “He is resourceful, persistent, and isn’t afraid to boldly ask God or others for what is needed to bring people clean water.”

HHI has a long history with Swenson, who was the first driller to use the SD50 drilling rig in Haiti. In the spring of 2010, he drilled 16 wells for HHI! Having grown up in a drilling family, Swenson brought his passion and experience to Healing Hands and has proven to be a huge asset for our clean water programs.

In Haiti, the new pump truck will be used to install and repair water well pumps, making these jobs faster and safer for our crews. The ability to restore wells that are no longer functioning is especially important to maintaining the essential clean water that so many families depend on every day throughout Haiti.

“It’s important to drill wells, but it’s equally important to maintain these wells,” said Smith. “We want to be a part of restoring wells that have stopped functioning and bringing back life and hope to communities through clean water.”

Thank you to our well drilling teams on the ground in Haiti, and to Arron Swenson, Kelly Perkins and the truck’s donor Loyd Ingraham. You truly make a difference!

# DREAMING BIG WITH WALK4WATER




**A**round a year ago, Walk4Water Coordinator Sean Judge set a “big dream” goal for the program that helps to fund our clean water projects – a goal to host 50 walks in one year. Since 2014, HHI has hosted around 27-30 walks a year. This year, setting that goal has brought the 2019 total to 46 scheduled walks, raising more than \$200,000 so far! The goal of 50 annual walks is well within reach.

“We cannot take any credit for the success,” Judge said. “We are seeing success because we know that God is connecting us with people who have a passion to help others. Because of those passionate people, more and more walks are starting up because they share their passion with others.”

While reaching 50 walks in 2020 is achievable, Judge and the Walk4Water team have now expanded that goal to eventually host a walk in all 50 states! As of this fall, Walk4Water will have hosted walks in 23 states and counting.
